Teachers plan further strike this week

Teachers are planning to strike on Wednesday after their first strike on Feb 1st was not successful as they didn't get the pay rise they wanted.

Last week the NEU went to meet the government to try and persuade them for a pay rise. If the government had said yes and put more cash in school budgets, the strikes would probably have been called off. The next strike dates after this week are March 15th and 16th. Teachers are also striking due to the amount of hours they have to work outside of school. This includes marking, planning lessons and meetings. Another reason is because the pay rise that teachers got was out of the school

budget, which means that there is less money for the school, so the children at schools won't have much money for resources. Miss Barnes said: "Teachers do not want to strike but it is the only way the government will recognise what we want to happen. I personally think that it isn't the best way to do this but it cannot be done any other way."

In the Infant school, two thirds of the teachers will be on strike. In the Junior school, there are twelve classes and three will be closed. Only teachers in the NEU (National Education Union) can strike, and no teaching assistants are allowed to strike this time.
