School Uniform Policy

Within our school we promote an atmosphere which encourages effort, enjoyment and a celebration of the achievements of all our pupils. Our concern for these high standards is also reflected in the pride we take in our school uniform and the feeling of belonging it creates.

It is our school policy that all children wear school uniform when attending school or when participating in a school organised event outside of normal school hours.

The uniform is part of our school ethos and in coming to Caister Junior School; parents agree to support our policy.

Aims and Objectives

Our policy for uniform is based on the belief that school uniform:

- Promotes a sense of pride in the school and it has a positive impact on behaviour and attitudes in school;
- Develops a sense of community and belonging towards the school;
- Identifies children with our school when taking part in out of school educational activities and visits;
- Is practical and looks smart;
- Makes children feel equal to others in terms of appearance;
- Is not distracting in class (as fashion clothes and hairstyles can be);
- Is regarded as suitable wear for school and considered by most parents as good value for money;
- Is designed with health and safety in mind.

Uniform with the school logo; sweatshirts, polo shirts, PE Kit are available from Harrisons Schoolwear, 6 High Street, Gorleston ~ Tel: 01493 662214, who are the schools approved stockists. Our uniform is also available online from www.tesco.com/ues. All uniform may, of course, be purchased from any shop. All other items can be bought from a variety of shops and supermarkets at a reasonable price.

If any parents do have any difficulties then please contact the school for support and guidance. Items of good quality, second hand uniform are often available for purchase. Please ask the office for information.

Remember to mark any clothing with names. The school cannot accept any responsibility for misplaced clothing but, if clothing is clearly marked, will make every effort to see lost items are returned.

Please reduce the 'risks' by ensuring that every garment or piece of clothing (including footwear) is clearly marked with your child's name.

Our school colours are gold and blue and our uniform consists of:

<p>Girls: Royal blue sweatshirt with logo Royal blue cardigan with logo White polo shirt with or without logo White blouse / shirt School tie (optional) Grey / Black skirt, pinafore dress or trousers Plain tights or socks</p> <p><u>Summer option:</u> Blue & white checked dress</p> <p>Suitable outdoor footwear: Flat shoes (NOT boots), trainers with white soles only <u>Summer option:</u> Plain strapped sandals (no flip-flops, no “open toes”)</p>	<p>Boys: Royal blue sweatshirt with logo White polo shirt with or without logo White shirt School tie (optional) Grey / Black trousers or shorts Plain socks</p> <p>Suitable outdoor footwear: Flat shoes (NOT boots), trainers with white soles only</p>
<p>PE kit (Girls & Boys) Outdoor: Royal blue polo shirt with logo Royal blue shorts Tracksuit or school rugby shirt Trainers with white soles</p>	<p>PE kit (Girls & Boys) Indoor: Royal blue polo shirt with logo Royal blue shorts Black plimsolls</p>
<p><u>Storage:</u> <i>PE kits should be stored in an appropriate bag (such as a drawstring bag) that can be kept in your child's locker. Each item should be named.</i></p>	
<p>Swimming in Year 5: Girls must wear a one piece swimming costume. Boys must wear trunks or “short” swimming shorts (not knee length baggy shorts) All children must wear a swimming hat</p>	

Jewellery

For Health and Safety reasons we do not allow children to wear jewellery in school. The exceptions to this rule are one pair of plain ear-ring studs in pierced ears and a watch.

Stud ear-rings should be removed or recently pierced ears should be taped over with a plaster (provided by parents) for PE and swimming and watches removed to prevent them causing injury.

Note: staff do not put ear studs, etc. back in if the child cannot manage it.

Hair

Hairstyles should be reasonable and appropriate for being in a learning environment at school. Extreme hairstyles would include shaved patterns in the scalp, Mohicans and unnaturally coloured dyes. Such hairstyles are not acceptable at school.

All children, girls and boys, are required to have their hair tied back, if long enough, for PE, DT and Cookery lessons.

Make-up

Make-up is not acceptable under any circumstances, including nail varnish. A child coming into school wearing nail varnish will be asked to remove it.

Role of the Head teacher and Governing Body

The Head teacher:

- Implements and monitor the policy throughout the school community as part of the duty within maintenance of day-to-day discipline in the school;
- Has overall responsibility for ensuring standards are maintained;
- Is responsible for any disciplinary measures required for failing to follow the uniform rules;
- Issues letters to parents / carers as required.

The Governing Body:

- Should be receptive to any reasonable complaint from parents or carers concerning uniform, by handling it respectfully and considering fully the issues they raise;
- Should aim to work with parents to arrive at a mutually acceptable outcome.

Role of the Staff

The staff will:

- Support the head teacher in maintaining high standards of uniform dress;
- Provide role models in the wearing of appropriate clothing and not wear tracksuits unless during a morning or afternoon session where Physical Education is being taught;
- No blue jeans or blue denim to be worn;
- Make discreet and sympathetic enquiries when children fail to wear school uniform;
- Give positive encouragement to children setting good examples of dress.

Role of the Parents / Carers

The Parents will:

- Support the School Uniform Policy;
- Ensure children come properly dressed and ready for their daily schoolwork every day; Ensure all items of clothing are clearly named – this helps lost items be easily identified and returned;
- Parents and carers should raise any complaints about the school uniform by following the school complaints procedure.

Role of the Children

The Children will:

- Wear the school uniform when attending school, representing the school or when participating in a school organised event outside normal school hours;
- Wear the school uniform with pride;
- Try to keep their uniform clean and tidy;
- Remember to bring kit on the correct days.

Inclusion

All children have equal access to wearing school uniform regardless of their race, religion, gender, disability or ability. We ensure that the set uniform respects other policies such as race relations, sex discrimination and allows for individual sets of circumstances of all groups and individuals.

Caister Junior School is committed to creating a positive climate that will enable everyone to work free from racial intimidation and harassment and to achieve their full potential.

Non-compliance with the School Uniform Policy

If a child breaches the uniform policy, a member of staff will discreetly talk to them to find out why they are not in uniform and to remind them of the need to wear one. An informal letter may be sent home to parents at this stage, notifying them of this breach.

Collective praise for wearing uniform as well as reminders of the need to do so, will also be given to classes within assemblies.

The teacher may feel the need to contact parents / carers to bring some suitable uniform to school immediately. As an alternative to this, a supply of spare uniform will be kept in school and children may be asked to change into this.

We understand that there may be some exceptional and unavoidable situations where children may have to come to school without a part of their school uniform (lost or damaged) then we ask parents to contact us on the day to confirm the reason.

Persistent non-compliance:

A member of the senior team may contact the parent directly to discuss this matter. Continued non-observance of the policy will result in a formal letter.

Exclusion is not normally an appropriate response to breaches of school uniform / appearance policies. However, where these breaches are persistent and in open defiance of the school's uniform or appearance policy, and where all other avenues have been exhausted, then the school may consider exclusion as a last resort depending on the circumstances of the case.

Caister Junior School expects all pupils and parents to conform with this policy, but in the event of persistent breaches, we will work closely with the parents / carers to resolve the situation.
